LOUIS GOLDMAN

I have lived in Glencoe for the greater part of my life, having grown up here (1954 to 1974) and then having returned mid career (1992 to present). Our three children attended the Glencoe schools and New Trier (two are still at home). We feel a strong attachment and affection for Glencoe and especially value the library, of which we are some of its more active users. The library, always a jewel, in recent years has become so much more than a place lending books; it has become a cornerstone of the community leading to a greater sense of cohesion among its residents.


I have a legal, financial and management background. I graduated from the University of California, Berkeley with a degree in economics (minor in mathematics) and then obtained my law degree from the University of Chicago Law School. Following a clerkship for a federal judge in San Francisco, I spent the first 15 years of my career in New York City where I practiced corporate, securities and M&A law with among others Cleary Gottlieb, a leading Wall Street law firm (including several years in their Paris office). After returning to Chicago in 1989, I spent 15 years at Altheimer & Gray where I Chaired both the Corporate and International Departments and eventually became Co-Chairman of the Firm. I have recently formed a boutique law firm in Chicago called Navigator Law Group focused on corporate projects including M&A projects, securities work and significant work with start-ups and angel investing groups.

I am a long-standing member of the Board of Trustees of the Ravinia Festival, the Board of Directors of the Ryan Opera Center at the Lyric Opera, and the Chicago China Sister Cities Committee. I am also the permanent secretary of my graduating class from the University of California, Berkeley.

Books have always been an important part of my life, from my childhood, going to the book-mobile, to my professional life as a magazine editor. I have also worked at both public and university libraries and have always utilized the library wherever I lived. Currently, I am a director of The League of Women Voters of Glencoe. We moved to Glencoe 23 years ago. From our first day we have been avid library users. Over the years we have seen the library change from allowing access not only to books, magazines, CDs and DVDs, but also to computer audiobooks, ebooks and to a 24-hour online catalog. The Glencoe library has evolved with the times and remains an important center of community life.

As publishing and technology changes even more, so must libraries, making this an exciting time to be a member of a library board. I look forward to working with the excellent staff to carry forward the mission of the Library to enrich the lives of Glencoe residents.

MICHELANGELO: EVOLUTION OF A RENAISSANCE SCULPTOR

In honor of the loan from The Vatican of an official copy of Michelangelo's *Pietà* to a Chicago area church, art historian Dr. Michelle Mishur returns to the Glencoe library to present a program about the sculptures of the Renaissance master. Examples of early works by Michelangelo, including *La Pietà* and *David*, will be considered, as well as later examples such as the Tomb of Julius II in Rome. Dr. Mishur also will discuss in detail Michelangelo's process for making sculpture and provide historical context for the works.

Join us for stories, songs, and active play specially developed and presented to help children **ages 0 to 23 months** learn to love books, songs, libraries, and learning.

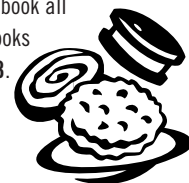

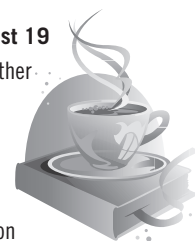
